

LOCAL LAW NO. 6-1960
CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY

A Local Law of the County of Chautauqua for the Year 1960 to Provide for the Establishment of
a Commission to Study and Make Recommendations Concerning County Government Including
Article 6-A, entitled "The County Charter Law", of the State of New York

BE IT ENACTED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Chautauqua as follows:

Section 1. That there be created in the County of Chautauqua Commission composed of four Supervisors and not less than seven or more than eleven citizens of Chautauqua County who shall serve on such Commission without compensation.

Section 2. That the Commission created by Section 1 be, and it is hereby is directed to study and make recommendation to the Board of Supervisors regarding County government including the desirability of adopting a charter form of government for the County of Chautauqua as authorized by Article 6-A of the County Law of the State of New York, and to report its findings and recommendations to the Board of Supervisors within a reasonable time.

Section 3. That the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be and he hereby is authorized to appoint the members of the Commission and to name two of its members to act as Chairman and Secretary respectively thereof.

Section 4. That the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors and the County Attorney be and they hereby are appointed as ex-officio members of said Commission, and that the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors be authorized to appoint from time to time such other County officers to be ex-officio members of said Commission, as will in his judgement be of assistance to the Commission in carrying out its duties.

Section 5. That the members of the Commission be paid their necessary expenses and mileage at the authorized County rate as provided in Section 203 of the County Law.

Section 6. This law shall become effective at the time it is filed with the Secretary of State.
