Gentlemen:

Pursuant to Section 34 of the New York State Election Law, we submit the Board of Elections Annual Report for the calendar year of 1971.

This past year has been an unusually active year for your Board of Elections. It was characterized by many Special Elections, the first on January 30, 1971 being: "Proposition for approval of establishment of Hanover Sewer District". Which read - Shall the resolution entitled: "Resolution of the Town of Hanover, New York, adopted November 24, 1970, approving the establishment of proposed Hanover Sewer District in said Town and construction of a sewage collecting system therein and the authorization of a contract with the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation for treatment and disposal of sewage and providing that such resolution shall be subject to a permissive referendum," BE APPROVED?

The resulting vote in the Irving area differentiated by the voting groups is as follows:

An affirmative majority vote resulted in each voting group, thus obviating any possible legal question as to the wishes of both voting groups. The above results were certified on February 1, 1971.

During May and June, 10 Towns and the City of Dunkirk were involved in Special Assessors Elections. These Elections permitted the qualified voters of the areas involved to vote for the continuance of Elected Assessors instead of the appointment of one full time assessor as provided by an amendment to the Real Property Tax Law.

June 22nd was the first day for circulating Designating Petitions. Dates for filing such Designating Petitions were between July 26 and 29 for the September 14th Primary. As a result of such action there were 74 Primary candidates for local office.

Public and Party Office Primaries were held on Tuesday, September 14, 1971 from 12:00 noon to 9:00 P.M. The Primary was held in the City of Dunkirk and all of the Towns EXCEPT - Busti and Pomfret and E.D. #1 in North Harmony. The City of Jamestown held a party Primary in Ward 6 E.D. 5.

The 8th Judicial District Supreme Court ordered a temporary 25 member Legislator plan causing wide spread interest in candidates filing for the Primary.

*Primary Winners

Although this office does not in accordance with Law, have anything to do with the printing of these petitions, we are deluged with questions on proper ways to execute them. Many of these petitions are filed with the Board of Elections. Those persons on whose behalf petitions have been filed are then notified and they can accept or decline the designation. Then it had to be established whether or not a Primary would occur in each of the offices and if so, prepare for it.

A total of 8,791 votes were cast with 417 of them being Blank or Void. The new Legislature is charged with developing a court approved permanent reapportionment plan by April 1, 1972.

The Board of Elections teams finished the canvass of all machines by 5:00 P.M. September 17th.

The dates for holding the Judicial Conventions were on September 17 and 18. The last day to fill a vacancy after declination of the Judicial Convention nomination was September 24th.

This office frequently receives from various individuals seeking Public Office questions of procedure. It is our advice to these individuals to seek the aid of legal counsel in order to avoid any possible complexities. Once again the Board of Elections was placed in the position of applying its ministerial duties as prescribed by the Election Law in invalidating nominating petitions for Public Office.

This office publishes an annual Political Calendar. The dates of the various activities are determined by the New York State Legislature. Due to the indefinite time of enactment by the Legislature, this office frequently publishes both a tentative and regular political calendar. Also, this office printed and distributed to all Candidates, Inspectors of Election and Party Chairmen, a pamphlet related to "Certain Sanctioned Procedures and Regulations Relating to Electioneering".

In preparation for the Primary and General Election a School of Instruction for Election Inspectors and alternates, was held in the auditorium of the Hall R. Clothier Memorial Building. A total of six classes were held from August 30th to September 1st. A total of 512 attended the six classes (448 Election Inspectors and 64 Alternates). A centralized School of Instructions permits the use of the overhead projector and a voting machine. Written examinations were administered to all Election Inspectors and covered many of the recent changes in the Election Law.

The General Election was held on November 2, 1971 from 6:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M.

As a result of a petition filed with the Town Clerk in the Town of Harmony and in turn filed in this office, five questions concerning the sale of Alcoholic Beverages were placed on the Town of Harmony Ballot.

A total of 831 persons voted on the questions, each being defeated by a wide margin.

The day following the November 2nd Election, this office received the Election supplies which were returned from all of the 125 Election Districts, the bulk before noon. These districts utilized 153 voting machines.

Bi-partisan teams, consisting of permanent employees began the canvass of the 153 voting machines that very afternoon. This requires a personal inspection of the sealed voting machines and verification of the results as recorded by the Election Inspectors. This physical inspection was completed by Friday at 5:00 P.M. At this time temporary help is needed annually to process the voluminous statistics in order that this office may certify the results within the mandated time.

Due to the time schedules mandated by the New York State Election Law, unusually heavy demands have been made on the County Printing Department by this office. For

example, Section 376 of the Election Law mandates the printing of Registration Lists for each of the 125 Election Districts of the newly registered voters of October 1st and 2nd.

Furthermore, the Election Law stipulates that a qualified person could move, up to and including Friday, October 22nd, thus changing his address and possibly the Election District. Therefore, accurate registration lists must be printed after this date. Our office is mandated per Section 376 Sub. 4, for the distribution of lists, not less than six days prior to the day of the Election, Wednesday, October 27th. Subdivision 5 of this section compels distribution of Registration Lists before the 6th day also to the Secretary of State and the Attorney General.

The Printer will receive in late January, data relative to the more than 65,000 registered voters for the completion of printed Enrollments (before the first of March, 1972 pursuant to Election Law, ss 377). Our efforts to process this data is impeded by Election Law, ss 186 which states that we cannot open the Enrollment box until the Tuesday following the General Election and the process must be completed before the first day of February, the succeeding year. Increased use of temporary employees for ten months of the year is due to the continually expanding normal and peak work load.

Concomitant with Sec. 377, Sec. 405 mandates a Purge List begun in the second week in December and be completed in the third week in January. All permanent records and data related to the more than 69,344 enrolled voters have to be individually examined to verify if the registrant has voted at least once in a General Election during the past two years. All those that have not must be notified by mail (4,507 individuals) of the impending cancellation of their status as a registered voter unless they fill out, sign and return the re-instatement request form within four weeks of the date of the postmark on the notification. After this four week interval the newly compiled list of 64,837 registered and enrolled voters are sent to the printer, pursuant to section 377 in conjunction with the needs of section 191. sub. 1-a.

Registration records under Section 381 of the Election Law are used for Village and School District Elections. Village Law, Section 4-426 (8a) states "However, if such Village is located in a County wherein Permanent Personal Registration is required, they (Village inspectors of Elections) shall copy such names from the registration poll records".

Such registration information is given by this office. In conjunction with this

a Political Calendar pertaining to these March Elections are available for interested individuals in the Villages of the County.

There is considerable discussion by the Joint Legislative Committee to place Village Registration under the supervision of the Board of Elections. Presently all individuals who are registered with the Board of Elections, under P.P.R. are automatically qualified to vote in Village Elections. Conversely, an individual who registers to vote under the Village registration system is not automatically qualified to vote in the General Election. This person must also register again under P.P.R. in order to vote in the General Election thus many Village residents are confused and disenfranchised by this dual system.

At least 8 months (March 2nd) before the General Election, each County, City, Village and Town Clerk, pursuant to Section 314 sub. 3, shall make and transmit to the Board of Elections, a certificate stating each County, City Village and Town officers respectively, to be voted on at the Election, including any local proposition or question known to such officer at the time of issuance of Certificate. If any officer is to be elected to fill a vacancy, the certificate shall so state. Within the above time period the Secretary of State shall make and transmit to the Board of Elections a Certificate stating each office above County level which lawfully may be voted for at the Election.

The concentration of such information in our office generates many inquiries throughout the year concerning Election Law, Petitions, Primaries and the General Election.

Section 392 of the New York State Election Law provides for a special check of all the registered voters in any or all of the Election Districts including those previously checked. This personal check of registrants is contingent upon the written, filed request of any one member of the Board of Elections and is conducted by legally constituted bi-partisan teams. This is especially important when one recognizes the fact that one family in five moves annually and the 18 - 30 age group is highly mobile.

The Election Commissioners Association, State of New York, which we are active members of have been seeking permissive legislation allowing any registrant who moves within the County to register by mail. This we feel with proper safeguards would be more convenient to the registrant and the Board of Elections.

Section 394, states the Board of Elections, not less than 15 days nor more than

30 days (September 1st and 16th) before the first day of Local Registration (October 1st) shall conduct a mail check of every registered voter. This entails processing 65,000 letters to the 125 Election Districts and notifying the registrant that such communication is a routine check to ascertain whether such voter still resides at this registration address. This September mailing resulted in 3,320 letters listed as undeliverable at the indicated address, plus an additional 801 individuals listed as "moved". Within one week (October 9th) after the conclusion of Local Registration the Board of Elections shall send similar communication (6,076) letters to every voter registered in such Local Registration.

At this point, pursuant to the Election Law, Sec. 331, Sub. 3, this Board calls upon Law Enforcement Agencies to investigate questionable declared and actual voter residency.

Whenever such communication is returned as undeliverable, the Board of Elections forthwith shall proceed in accordance with the powers granted to it by Section 406 to determine whether such registration of the affected person shall be cancelled. This Board received 5,437 letters in 1970 and 4,121 letters in 1971 as undeliverable, and such legal determinations were made and verified in the 20 days prior to Election Day on November 2nd. In addition this office issued 326 Military and 99 Military Dependents Ballots. Absentee Ballots issued were 1,439, with 1,022 Ballots voted.

The accuracy and efficiency in processing this data is reflected in that 6 Court Orders were issued. This office does assist in initiating such action as the direct result of any newly acquired information and forwarding it to the issuing Justice.

This office is in reality an office of Vital Statistics of the most current information available on a County wide basis. Each and every month pursuant to Section 397, sub. 1, this office receives from the public recording officers of the 15 Villages, 27 Towns and 2 Cities, the deaths in their respective areas in order that we may remove the deceased person from the current registration list. The number of cancelled forms due to deaths, transfers, moving etc. came to 7,277 for 1971. The continual updating of names and addresses as mandated by the Election Law, of Chautauqua County residents in our office results in many requests for information

from the Courts, FBI, Social Security Administration, Attorneys, Private Agencies and individuals. This office is one source of names and addresses to the Federal and County Courts for use as potential Jurors. In fact, this office provides many such services for several County Departments.

The non-Presidential Election years present a greater work-load to the Board of Elections than does the Presidential Election. Ironically, an increase in the number of registered non-voters is equated with a larger office work load which is best illustrated as follows:

The increased work load factor develops because every non-voter has to be thus recorded annually on his individual addressograph plate for future purges. The 13,589 non-voters represent a slight decrease from last year and involves a tedious process.

Beginning the 1st day of Central Registration on January 4, 1971 and thereafter all persons 18 years of age or older who are otherwise qualified to vote would be eligible to register and vote at all Primary, Special and General Elections held on or after January 4, 1971, this includes the right of Special Enrollment for the 1971 Primary for such new voters pursuant to Section 187 and 388 of the Election Law.

The United States Supreme Court had rendered its decision on the Federal Voting Right Act of 1970 and said that the provision of the Act pertaining to 18 - 20 year olds voting can only be applied to Federal Elections. This meant that 18 year olds would be allowed one vote for Presidential Electors and Representatives in Congress. All state and local elections would be governed by the State Election Laws which still require a voter to be 21 years of age.

The result was a slow response to register, possibly because 1972 was the first scheduled Federal Election. Registration field trips to the State University College at Fredonia, the Jamestown Community College and various High Schools and the Court House before the 30th of June did stir some interest. Panama School system registered 83% of their eligible students on January 13, 1971.

With the 38th State ratifying and the President signing the Constitutional Amendment lowering the voting age to 18 in all Elections, interest increased markedly. Six days of registration were held at the County Fair in Dunkirk and two days at the Jamestown Post Office on Saturday, August 7th and August 13th. August 13th was the last day to qualify for the September 14th Primary.

During the period of August 16th to 31st, 768 more individuals registered in our office. Furthermore, 819 students 18 to 20 years of age applied for absentee voters ballots and we felt gratified in the initial results of both registration and voting of these individuals.

The current total Voter Registration in Chautauqua County compared with last year shows an increase of 7.4%.

There is another indicator of additional registrants. There are 22 Election Districts in 12 Towns and 10 Election Districts in the City of Jamestown that are at or over the recommended number of registrants. These Election Districts need extra Election Clerks and Voting Machines on Election Day. In some areas a realignment or another Election District is advisable.
