Pursuant to the New York State E.L. ss 3-212, and ss 15-09 of the Chautauqua County Administrative Code, we submit the Board of Election's Annual Report for the calendar year of 1979.

The political year began with Central Voter Registration, (E.L. ss 5-200) for the purposes of the 1979 annual report on Thursday, December 7, 1978.

Few people realize that our county is the 16th largest in population of the 57 counties located outside of New York City. Forty one counties are smaller! All election expenses must be paid by the county. This office experienced a legislative cut of \$12,000 for this year from the County Executive's budget. Because of this reduction \$12,000 was transferred to and from our various accounts to meet our obligations.

Concomitant with E.L. ss 5-400, ss 5-406 mandates a Purge List to begin in the second week in December and be completed not later than the third week in the succeeding January. All permanent records and data related to the more than enrolled voters have to be individually examined to verify if the registrant has voted at least once in a General Election during the past two years. All those who have not must be notified by mail. The number of those purged in the month of December follows:

The fallacy of New York State Election Law of removing registered voters for not voting every two years is evident in the large number of registrants removed in 1978 and in 1974..... two years after the Presidential elections. Every county has a large number of these registrants that cannot be legislated to vote more frequently than the Presidential election, i.e., every 4 years. A cost reduction and better service to these individuals would result in a four year purge and would eliminate registering to vote and processing of forms.

The cancellation of these registered voters occurs when they fail to fill out, sign and return the re-instatement request form within three weeks of the postmark on the notification. After this three-week interval in January, the newly compiled list of Enrolled Voters is then sent to the printer, pursuant to E.L. ss 5-604 in conjunction with the need of E.L. ss 8-100 concerning Primary elections. Such lists must be printed prior to the first day of March in which there is a Spring Primary.

Our efforts to process this data is impeded by E.L. ss 5-302(4) which states that we cannot open the entire year's enrollment until the Tuesday following the General Election and the process must be completed not later than the 30th day preceding the last day to publish enrollment lists. Registration records under E.L. ss 5-612 and ss 15-118 are used for Village and School District elections. Election Law ss 15-118 states if such village does not require Permanent Personal Registration, they (Village Inspectors of Elections) shall adopt or copy such names from the registration lists certified and supplied by the County Board of Elections to the extent applicable. Unfortunately, only 4 villages, i.e., Brocton, Celoron, Fredonia, and Lakewood village lines conform to the Town election districts. Thus the Inspectors in the other 11 villages must be sufficiently knowledgeable where the legal village/town lines are in order to extract the registrants to be placed on the registration rolls for Village elections.

Fourteen villages had Registration on March 3rd (Fredonia, February 24th). The village election day was on March 21st with the exception of Fredonia which was March 13th. Village candidates for office had this schedule:

Furthermore, any qualified Village elector may register centrally or by mail until 10 days before (E.L. ss 5-200) an election, i.e., March 10th or Fredonia on March 2nd. This office must then forward those village registrants to such clerks immediately for the March election.

Since September 1, 1973, all of the 15 County Village Elections are conducted under Article 15 of the Election Law. The Election Officer is the Village Clerk (E.L. ss 15-124). In addition to supplying voter registration lists, the Board of Elections is involved by publishing Village Election Calendars; supplying information of the office and vacancies which are up for election per E.L. 4-106, 15-104, and V.L. 3-302; canvassing voting machines upon candidate request E.L. ss 15-126(2) and such Election Law and procedures as are germane.

Financial reports are required from the village candidates where there is a population of 5,000 or more residents in the village. Only Fredonia meets this category. However, unless the aggregate receipts of said candidate and his authorized committees, or the aggregate expenditures made by such candidate and his authorized committees exceed \$1,000 such financial reports must be filed irrespective of population.

Board of Elections registrants are automatically qualified to vote in Village elections. Conversely, an individual who registers to vote under the Village

and School registration system is NOT automatically qualified to vote in a November General Election. Such person must personally register again under P.P.R. or use the mail registration forms to order to vote in a November General Election. Thus, many village residents and school voters are confused and disenfranchised by this registration system when they attempt to vote in a November Election.

At least 8 months before the General Election, each County, City, Village, and Town Clerk, pursuant to E.L.ss 4-106, 15-104 and V.L.ss 3-302 shall make and transmit to the Board of Elections a certificate stating each County, City, Village, and Town Officer respectively, to be voted on at the General Election. Within 3 days after the occurrence of any vacancy in an office required to be filled at the next General Election, such clerk shall file with the County Board of Elections a certificate indicating the occurrence of the vacancy and the position which is to be filled. A vacancy occurring before September 20th of any year must be on the November ballot (P.O.L.ss 42) that year.

Any proposal, proposition or referendum as provided by law, that is to be submitted to a vote of the people shall be transmitted to the Board of Elections (E.L.ss 4-108(b)) at least 29 days prior to the Election by the Clerk of a County, City, Town, Village, or special district, at an election conducted by the Board of Elections.

The concentration of such information in our office generates many inquiries throughout the year concerning the Election Law, petitions, party caucus, primaries, general elections, A.B.C. local option, referendum, special elections school board elections, fire districts, June State, National and September Judicial Designating Convention.

In the month of May, this office completed its eighth annual voter registration drive within the high schools of Chautauqua County and other areas. Positive response to this effort is shown in the figures below which gives an eight year total for comparison. Such registrants are informed of enrollment, absentee voting, impending School Board elections, Primaries, Special elections, and the November General Election.

High School voter registration and field registration is conducted by our permanent staff and/or temporary help which we use to train many Election Inspectors. The results were as follows:

The Board of Elections administered the Oath of Office to the Election Inspectors of Jamestown and Dunkirk on July 16th in their respective City Halls between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. A total of 204 Election Inspectors were eligible to take the Oath of Office.

In preparation for the Primary and General Election a School of Instruction for Election Inspectors and Alternates was held in the Hall Clothier Building auditorium. A total of six afternoon and evening classes was held with a total of 460 persons attending.

All Election Inspectors and Alternates shall be paid not less than \$5.00 for each training session and mileage not to exceed the rate approved by their respective municipality for attending such school (E.L.ss 3-412, 3-420).

A centralized school of instructions permits the use of office equipment, supplies, and voting machine. Written examinations were administered to all of these inspectors and covered many of the recent changes in the Election Law.

Although this office does not, in accordance with law, have anything to do with the printing of petitions, we are deluged with questions on proper ways to execute them. This office frequently receives from various individuals seeking public office questions of procedure. It is our advice to these individuals to seek the aid of legal counsel in order to avoid any possible complexities; despite this advice office seekers are disqualified and/or resort to Court action after the fact!

Most petitions and Certificates of Nomination are filed with the Board of Elections. Those persons on whose behalf petitions have been filed are then notified and they can accept or decline the designation. At this point it must be established whether or not a Primary Election would occur in any of the offices and, if so, prepare for it.

June 19th was the first day for circulating Designating Petitions. Dates for filing such petitions were between July 23rd and 26th for the September 11th (Tuesday) Primary Election from noon to 9:00 p.m. As a result of such action there were Primary candidates for town, county, legislative district, and city of Dunkirk offices. The three party primaries involved 34 election districts. The Conservative Party had filed a petition for opportunity to ballot (write-in a candidate) in addition to the regular Conservative candidate. This considerably complicated the voting machine set-up for 9 custodians and 136 Election Inspectors' report tally. A two party primary was conducted in the town of Arkwright. The canvass of the voting machines was completed by 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 13, 1979.

This is the sixth year that the State and County Board of Elections are held responsible for candidates filing financial statements. We have a filing capacity for 621 candidates and committees.

This is the seventh Primary Election that permitted absentee voting since enactment in 1974. No Federal Voter ballots were involved.

The expansion of services and costs that are placed on Board of Elections by Federal, State and/or Court decisions is a major problem. This office is one of the largest offices in County government that receives absolutely ZERO DOLLARS to carry out the mandates of these august bodies.

** This report requirement is waived if the 27 Day Post-Primary Report is required and submitted, containing the information required to be filed in the October 5th report.

In addition to the above filing dates, financial statements shall also be filed on the 15th day of January, May, and September, of each subsequent year until such time as the candidate or committee terminates activities. The cut-off date for these statements will be the 11th day of the appropriate month.

Due to the time schedules mandated by the New York State Election Law, unusually heavy demands have been made on the County Printing Department by this office. For example, E.L.ss 5-602 mandates the printing of voter registration lists for each of the new local 1,010 registered voters of September 29th, plus the mail registrants whose final deadline was October 9th.

Furthermore, E.L.ss 5-200(2) stipulates that a qualified person could move up to and including October 26th thus changing his address and possibly the election district. Therefore, accurate supplemental registration lists must be printed quickly after this date.

This office is mandated by E.L.ss 5-602 for the distribution of such lists before the sixth day that the General Election occurs. The date this year was October 30, 1979. E.L.ss 5-602(3) compels distribution of Registration Lists before the 6th day to the State Board of Elections.

The day following the General Election this office received the election supplies which were returned from all of the 132 Election Districts, the bulk of which was received before noon.

Traveling bi-partisan teams consisting of permanent employees began the canvass of the 146 voting machines and verification of the results as recorded by the Election Inspectors. This physical inspection was completed by the following Friday at 5:00 p.m. At this time temporary help is needed annually to process the voluminous statistics in order that this office may certify the results within the mandated time. Certified copies of Election results were finished and mailed (E.L.ss 9-214) prior to the 25 day deadline. The various offices were to be filed with the State Board of Elections, Attorney-General and Secretary of State.

This office has just completed its second year under Recodification of the Election Law Chapter 233 Laws of 1976 with the effective date being December 1, 1977.

The mailing of purge cards to individuals due to their not voting during the past two years was completed on December 10, 1979.

Election Law section 5-712 states the Board of Elections, not less than 15 days, nor more than 30 days before the first day before the first day of Local Registration (September 29) shall conduct a Mail Check of every registered voter.

This entails processing 61,118 letters to the 132 Election Districts, printing 132 different letters, and notifying the registrants that such communication is a routine check to ascertain whether such voter still resides at this address. Within one week after the conclusion of Local Registration, September 29th, the Board of Elections shall send a similar communication 8,057 letters to every voter registered in such local registration period. The pre-sorted postage costs amounted to \$8,992.75 for these mailings.

Whenever such communication is returned as undeliverable, the Board of Elections forthwith shall proceed in accordance with the powers granted to it by E.L.ss 5-402, 5-404, 5-400 to determine whether such registration of the affected person shall be cancelled. Such legal determinations were made and verified prior to Election Day on November 6th.

This is the fifth year all New York State Boards of Election are mandated by law to obtain "unofficial" results the night of Primary and General Elections, (E.L.ss 9-126(2B)). This required the use of 104 electric adding machines "borrowed" from various departments within the County Court House. Our staff of twelve was augmented by volunteers. Thirty seven telephones were used to receive the unofficial results.

This office is in reality, an office of vital statistics of the most current information available on a county-wide basis. Each and every month pursuant to E.L.ss 5-400, 5-708, this office receives from the public recording officers of the 15 villages, 27 towns, and 2 cities, the deaths in their respective areas in order that we may remove the deceased person from the current registration list. The continual updating of names and addresses as mandated by the Election Law of Chautauqua County residents in our office results in many requests for information from the Courts, FBI, Social Security Administration, attorneys, private agencies, and individuals.

Contrary to common belief, this office is not the only source of names to Federal and County Courts for use as potential jurors. In fact, this office provides other such services for several County Departments.

On December 1, 1975, Registration and Enrollment by mail first went into effect. In order to facilitate voter registration these forms are now available at the Clerk's office of the two cities, 15 villages, and 27 towns. This office received and processed 1,830 new registrants by mail during the 1979 Registration and Enrollment year. Another 1,899 transferred with this form.

Many units of County Government have decentralized by establishing branch offices in the Dunkirk and Jamestown areas. Census figures reveal that more than 80% of the County population resides within a ten mile radius of both cities. Government exists to serve its constituents and this office believes the Board of Elections should establish such branch offices.
